

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

On an ending note, I would like to quote American Songwriter and Singer B.B. King: "A beautiful thing about learning is that nobody can take it away from you."












break amidst this series of life.



When Everyone Felt Like Home: Landour Bazaar

R uskin Bond, known for his simplistic and witty writing style has always captivated the audience with charm in his words. Another example of one of his great works is Landour Bazaar, fictional in genre. Published in 2018, the name of the book is that of a local market of Landour, where Bond lived.

The book is like a surprise box with an amalgamation of many forms of literature including novellas, fictions, essays and anecdotes from the time he lived in Landour. With the book divided into 17 chapters, each chapter has its own essence of nostalgia for the writer as well as the readers who are taken to a journey to the life of the mountains. There is no central theme to the book, it contains titbits of everything: love, nostalgia, thrill, humour, horror, life and death and history. All the tales have the power to invoke imagery for the reader, which makes the whole experience of reading the book magical. The mention of stories about his life like "The story of Madhu" and "Voting at Barlowganj" shows how simple yet subtle the life of



people in the mountains is. Bond is certainly able to show his love for the people and the place he belonged to. A chapter "Once you've lived in the Mountains" solely belongs to show his love for mountains, which in my view, is one of the most engaging and personalised chapters.

I found the book very personal, in way it made me feel like a part of Bond's life. With random way presenting the work, it made the book feel like a journal, which actually formed an emotional attachment with the reader. In the last paragraph of the book (Chapter – Landour Bazaar) he writes,

"He gets up immediately, a thin boy wearing only a shirt and part of an old tracksuit. He follows me without any hesitation. I cannot now betray his trust. Nor can I fail to trust him."

These lines have a certain attractiveness to them, focusing on the theme of humanity, which is indeed another proof to why Bond's work is simply beautiful and worth investing your time in.

In the introduction, it is said by Bond:

"And I hope that it would inspire you to come visit us too someday."

With this book, Bond is sure able to get people to see his home, in his books and in Real life.


The Complete Works of Swami Vivekananda

The works of Swami Vivekananda are not unknown to mankind, he is known for his teachings and doctrines all around the world and where most people didn't have the fate to meet him and be around him learn from his words and wisdom, we were lucky because all his works were compiled into a set of 10 volumes on the book based on the works of his life. The book obviously doesn't do justice to what he would have actually said and experienced but it definitely gives a glimpse into what his life and philosophies were. It simply makes the reader reflect and question based on the own thinking ability as it clearly mentions unity in variety is the plan of creation, men and women may vary individually but there is unity in the background. The variety was created on purpose hence we ought not to judge them by the same standard or put the same ideal before them (page 41 Karma Yoga) in my opinion this book is a must-read for every age group and I personally feel that the more I read it the more I reflect on myself.

colleges were directed to spread religious propagandas and life of young Satrapi slowly transformed from being a happy and innocent child to a rebellious and scarred teen.





Her house is carried away in a tornado and she awakes to find that her house has landed in the land of Oz and killed the wicked witch of the East, a cruel witch who ruled over the Munchkins


Trying to get home, Dorothy puts on the wicked Witch's silver shoes and after consulting with the Good Witch of the North, learns that she must ask Oz, the great warrior in Emerald City, to help her get back home. Travelling along the yellow brick road, Dorothy meets three unique individuals all hoping Oz can grant their desires. Scarecrow, a dumb, wants Oz to give him a brain. Tin Woodman, a man made from tin, wants Oz to give him a heart. And Lion, a cowardly lion, wants Oz to give him courage. The group finally arrives at Emerald City, a grand city coloured in green. There, they talk to Oz who agrees



to fulfil their desires but only under one condition that if they destroy the wicked witch of west. First, they all show some resentment and than they decide to give it a try.

When they enter the land of wicked witch of the West, the group is attacked by crows, wolves and bees, but defeat each quite easily. Seeing the power of the group, wicked witch of west orders Wicked monkey to attack them. Unfortunately, the monkeys destroy scarecrow and Tin man, but capture lion and Dorothy. And while being held prisoner, Dorothy destroys the wicked witch by splashing her with a bucket of water.

The group goes back to Emerald City and demands Oz to fulfil his promise. However, they discover Oz to be nothing more than a normal man. Oz pretends to give scarecrow, Tin man, and lion what they want, but to help Dorothy to get back home. He builds a hot air balloon. Unfortunately, the balloon flies without her. Upset, Dorothy is told to go to the Good Witch of the South for help. The group meets the Good witch and Dorothy is told that her silver shoes can magically send her anywhere she wants. In the end, with the special power of her shoes, Dorothy gets back to Kansas.



The main message of the story is how we all, at times, feel inadequate. Scarecrow lacks intelligence, Tin man lacks heart, lion lacks courage and Dorothy seeks family.

On some level, readers can at least relate to one of these characters and what they seek. However, as the story demonstrates, we all have seeds of these things already inside us. In the story, we see this is in the scene where the group is crossing the canyon. Scarecrow uses problem solving skills to think how to get over the canyon, Lion demonstrates courage to jump over, and Tin man has enough heart to feel sympathy toward killing animals. As such, a strength of the story is the character and the interactions each of them has with each other.

Early in the story, there is an interesting discussion between Scarecrow and Tin man about what is the most valuable thing to have. Scarecrow believes that knowledge and intellect are the most important thing, while Tin man believes that heart and happiness are the most important thing. Whether a reader falls into either of these camps of thought-knowledge vs love-is not necessarily the point. Rather, this discussion exposes the notion that priorities

are highly subjective and often rooted in what we seek most out of life. That not everyone should or has the same needs and wants.



Its last chapter entitled 'contemplation' contains a condensation of idea and thought arising out of the colourful life, the awards that he received (the highest honour, namely Bharata Ratna that he received does no find a mention in this book) and some message for the future generation.

The author through this book and the various chapters builds a quick rapport with the reader, who is spellbound. It stresses on the point that the youth should not get disheartened by failures. According to Kalam, source of hidden knowledge is within us, with whom we should communicate. 






The Institute: Stephen King


Murder On The Orient Express: Agatha Christie



ABOUT THE AUTHOR: Agatha Christie was an English writer known for her sixty-six detective novels and fourteen short story collections, particularly those revolving around fictional detectives Hercule Poirot and Miss Marple. She also wrote the world's longestrunning play, The Mousetrap, performed in the West End from 1952 to 2020, as well as six novels under the pseudonym Mary Westmacott. In 1971, she was appointed a Dame Commander of the Order of the British Empire (DBE) for her contribution to literature. Guinness World Records lists Christie as the best-selling fiction writer of all time, her novels having sold over two billion copies. She died on 12 January 1976.

SUMMARY: Murder on the Orient Express is undoubtedly one of Agatha Christie's greatest mystery novels. Just after midnight, a snowdrift stops the Orient Express in its tracks. The luxurious train is surprisingly full for the time of the year, but by the morning it is one passenger fewer. An American tycoon lies dead in his compartment, stabbed a dozen times, his door locked from the inside. Isolated and with a killer in their midst, detective Hercule Poirot must identify the murderer — in case he or she decides to strike again.



Jem and Scout, Atticus Finch's sons, see the heart of their town laid bare — divided not just between black and white, but also between the prevailing racism and "the handful of people in this town who say that fair play is not marked White Only" when a black man accused of raping a white woman is proved guilty. Yet lawyer Atticus questions the charge and defends the accused man in a town soaked in prejudice. The children then get to know the "Negroes in the Quarters," too, where they are welcomed because their father is a hero, willing to stand up against an entire town on behalf of justice. They see the evil born of ignorance and squalor and they see their father, under whose quiet righteousness and gentle civility lives an undemonstrative love that will always be there.

The beauty of this true piece of literature is that everyone who reads it can take something unique and personalised out of it and this book is relevant

in every period because even today innocent people are suffering due to inequality and discrimination. In fact if Atticus would have been present in this modern era, he would now also be defending issues that Harper Lee did not consider while writing the book, such as rights of people with different sexualities, because at the heart of his character is an acceptance for who people are. He's a human being and he sees everyone else in the same way.

I would really suggest picking up a copy of Harper Lee's magnificent novel and giving it a try. Because whatever happens, it will never stop being a good book, and it will never stop inspiring people.

Train To Pakistan: Khushwant Singh

A BOUT THE AUTHOR: Khushwant Singh, born on February 2, 1915, was an Indian author, lawyer, diplomat, journalist and politician. His experience during the partition of 1947 inspired him to write Train to Pakistan in 1986. He was awarded Padma Bhushan in 1974, Padma Vibhushan in 2007 Sahitya Akademi fellowship in 2010 and many more. His other famous works are The SikhsToday (1959), Delhi; a novel (1990), The company of women (1999)and Truth, love and a Little Malice, an autobiography (2002). He died on March 20, 2014, at the age of 99.

SUMMARY: Train to Pakistan takes place in the fictional town of Mano Majra which was near partition. Many towns like these had a great diversity of religions and cultures. But the British took no account of these towns, and so great violence erupted within them. In contrast, the author shows Mano Majra as maintaining its order, given its relative isolation. The story begins with the robbery and murder of Lala Ram Lal, the only Hindu family in the town. The murderers were the gang


led by Malli, who were looking for their old fellow Jugga, with a bad reputation. During the


event of the dacoit, however, Jugga was making love with his partner Nooran, who was the daughter of towns Mulla (who's a Muslim) whereas Jugga was Sikh. At the same time arrived Iqbal Singh, who arrived in the town to organise the peasants for people's party of India. Mali and the gang try to pin the crime on Jugga, which results in arrest of both Jugga and Iqbal due to local suspicion. They are arrested on the orders of the regional magistrate. While they are in prison, conflicts start to rise in Mano Majra, when a train full of Muslim corpses is brought to the town and burnt by soldiers. Not long after, a group of soldiers come by to evacuate the Muslim half of the town to Pakistan which leads Nooran to depart while using Jugga is in jail.

After the Muslims are evacuated, a local band of Sikhs comes to Majra to whip up anti-Muslim sentiment and sabotage the train that was taking Muslims to Pakistan. Hukum was although corrupt but racked with guilt, releases Jugga and Iqbal. Although Iqbal was a social reformer and Jugga was a Thug. But Iqbal drinks himself into a stupor and Jugga gives his life destroying the rope, the Sikhs had set upto throw Muslims on top of the train off to their death.

MY PERSONAL OPINION: A good read since it really kept its flavour at the end. I was startled especially with the ending it had. Also the hardships people had to go through due to partition is immense and unimaginable. There were too many unwanted characters I felt who did nothing though. The story was left hanging and then begins with totally different description. Full of drama, elaborated and flamboyant explanations of characters and scenes make it simple and easy to understand. Every character is etched out and one can imagine them vividly. It contains the tragic history of India during partition. I almost somewhere could feel the pain of the people during partition. 
Movie Reviews

Aligarh: An Expression of Homophobia

DIRECTED BY: Hansal Mehta

A ligarh (2016), written by Apurva Asrani and directed by Hansal Mehta is a very reflective cinematic adaptation of a real life story about homophobia and its consequences for the victim. It is based on the life and death of Prof. Ramachandra Siras, a Marathi teacher in Aligarh Muslim University who is made to suffer mentally and physically for his sexual orientation.

The basic theme of the movie is to bring out the injustices related to being different from the mainstream society. It shows how homophobia in a reputed educational institution results in immense suffering to a professor who identifies as homosexual, which includes losing his accommodation, his post and respect from most of his colleagues. The story is presented to the audience through a reporter, who is keen to provide justice to the victim and ends up forming a strong connection with the professor. The story very subtly expresses the agony of the professor which starts from the breach of his privacy to ultimately his end.



Actors Manoj Bajpai (as Prof. Siras) and Rajkumar Rao (as Reporter) have established their characters very well with their exceptional acting. Citing a scene from the movie: after all the breach of his privacy, and forcefully recording his intimate actions with his lover who is a rickshaw puller, Prof Siras sits in his room, drinking and listening to *Aapki nazron ne samjha*; the emotion portrayal of the professor by Mr. Bajpai easily depicts the unmentioned pain and suffering in his heart and the turmoil in his mind, stunning the audience and making it one of the finest scenes of the movie. The writing genius is very well noted in the scenes including the conversations of the Reporter and Professor. One such line about the nature of poetry:

"Poetry shabdon mei kahan hoti hai baba. Kavita shabdon ke beech mei milti hai. Silences mei. Pauses mei. Phir har koi apne apne hisab se apna arth nikalte hai. According to their age, maturity, life experience. Understand?"

The movie very sensibly raises the issue of homophobia, also showing the unnecessary exaggeration and hate towards it. It is clearly portrayed how Prof. Siras strives for nothing but his respect, till the last moments. The fact that the scenes are portrayed so subtly, they engage the audience into the journey of Prof. Siras and his struggle for nothing but respect, in a land he considers foreign. The movie is highly centred on breaking the stereotypical thinking on which validation of every wrong action is given. This cinematic masterpiece gives the audience an incident, to think on critically about the harsh realities of the world. The



personalised touch to it by the actors actually takes the audience to a journey, which has an end leaving everyone teary eyed. One thing that was certainly left out was a little more emphasis on the take of the rickshaw puller, who was also badly harassed. His part could have added another perspective to the story, on how the underprivileged are made to suffer more.

The various aspects of the story and the emphasis on every part of the theme of the story very sensitively makes Aligarh, one of finest pieces of art, which tends to leave a deep impact on the mindset of the viewers.

guy and another senior who becomes a dear friend of Charlie as they learn to deal with their own pains along the way.






Sholay


I t is heartbreaking when a genius won't recognise himself, and that is the most baffling problem of all in "Good Will Hunting," the smart, involving story of a working-class kid from Boston directed by Gus Van Sant.

The film stars Matt Damon as a janitor at MIT named Will Hunting who likes to party and hang around the old neighbourhood and who has a photographic memory. Stellan Skarsgard plays Lambeau, the professor at MIT, and Robin Williams as Sean McGuire, Lambeau's old college roommate, now a community college professor who has messed up his own life, but is a gifted counsellor.

The movie begins when Lambeau offers a prize to any student who can solve a difficult problem. The next morning, the answer is written on a blackboard standing in the hall but none of his students has done that. A

few days later, Lambeau catches Will Hunting at the board and realises he's the one who did it and is a natural

mathematical genius. Lambeau wants to help Will, to get him into school. But before this could happen, Will and some of his friends while cruising the old neighbourhood beat up a guy for which he is jailed. Lambeau gets probation for Will with a promise that he'll find him help and counselling. Thus, "Good Will Hunting" is the story of how this kid's life edges toward self-destruction and how four people try to haul him back. One is Lambeau, the professor, second is Sean McGuire, the counsellor, third is Skylar (Minnie Driver), a British student at Harvard, who falls in love with Will and tries to help him and the fourth person is Chuckie (Ben Affleck), Will's friend since childhood, who tells him "You're sitting on a winning lottery ticket. It would be an insult to us if you're still around here in 20 years." But Will Hunting is a tough nut. He sees nothing wrong with spending his whole life hanging out with his friends, quaffing a few beers, holding down a blue-collar job. His reluctance to embrace the opportunity at MIT is based partly on class pride that this would mean betraying his friends and the old neighbourhood and partly on old psychic wounds. And it is only through



breaking through to those scars and sharing some of his own that McGuire, the counsellor, is able to help him. The film has a good ear for the way these characters might really talk. It sometimes seems to have perfect pitch when it comes to dialogue; like the scene where Matt and Skylar break up and say hurtful things, we can see how clear it is that Matt is pushing her away because he doesn't think he deserves her and the scene where McGuire finally gets Will to repeat, "It's not my fault." The outcome of the movie is fairly predictable; so is the whole story, really. It's the individual moments, not the payoff, that make it so effective. The movie has a bittersweet ending but is worth a watch.

Good Will Hunting



The two actors who were at the peak of there carrier when they came together for this movie while a generation set them apart, their commitment to the craft of acting shines through in this classic film, 'Good Will Hunting.'

The title of this film is based on the name of its main character, Will Hunting (played by Matt Damon), a 20-year old, born and raised in South Boston. Will from outside seems to be a regular guy, but he was born with the innate gift of having a genius-level intellect. He holds a particular interest in mathematics but never enrolled in any course or never attended any school.

Will had a rough upbringing as his parents abandoned him when he was a baby, and he grew up in foster homes where his foster father abused him physically multiple times. As a result, Will had a fear of abandonment, and his social interactions were limited because of the abusive childhood he endured. Still, he is happy with his three friends: Billy, Morgan, and his best friend Chuckie.




Wills's friends are loyal, but they are not the best influence on him. The group fights lead Will to acting out his aggression violently, which ends him up to assaulting a police officer, causing him to do mandatory community service and therapy sessions. Will, a cleaner at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, works during after hours to clean the bathrooms. Not known to both students and professors alike, Will in his spare time has been going around solving advanced Math equations that the regular MIT graduate students can't find solutions for. One night, Will is caught in the act as he gets caught doing an extremely difficult problem that no one else has solved yet. Professor Lambeau of the Mathematics department discovers Will solving this problem, but Will flees.

Lambeau tracks him down. Unfortunately, by the time the professor finds him, Will is in jail for assaulting a police offer.

The judge agrees to release Will under two conditions: he spends one day a week meeting with Lambeau and spending one day a week meeting with a therapist. Eventually, once several psychologists have rejected the young man, Sean McGuire, a teacher at Bunker Hill Community College, agrees to take the case. After a rocky start, the two form a relationship, and Will begins to explore issues and emotions he was holding behind his armour. As Will advances his self-awareness in sessions with Sean, he also learns about friendship from his buddy, Chuckie (Ben Affleck), and love from a Harvard co-ed named Skylar (Minnie Driver).

With the help of Sean and Skylar, he eventually learns that while his life has been tragic, that should not prevent him from reaching his true potential.

Sean also is the father figure that Will never had. Sean was also abused as a child and knew where Will is coming from. However, he has to learn how to put the past behind him and to not blame himself for what



had happened because it simply wasn't his fault. Will was an innocent child and can't be blamed for such a horrific event. Will has to learn again how to be emotionally open and vulnerable with the people who care about him like Sean and Skylar. Will had lost the inability to love and be loved, but it's never too late to get that back.

Throughout the movie, the relationship between Sean and Will through the therapy sessions keeps on progressing beautifully. Sean shares real-life experiences with Will to help him open up about his traumas. Like Sean shares his wife's stories, the one true love he lost to a long battle with cancer years ago hasn't been able to become romantically involved with anyone since then. Both men have their inner demons to fight, but they encourage each other to become better, strive for more, and live good lives. With Will's urging, Sean is also ready to put his tragic past behind him to begin anew. He sets out to travel the world, meet a special someone like Will has with Skylar, and truly live life again.


Ship of Theseus

Ship of Theseus is an Indian drama film which explores the question of "justice, identity, beauty and death" by the stories of a photographer (Aliya), a monk (Maitreya) and stockbroker (Navin).

PLOT: Aliya Kamal is a visually impaired Egyptian photographer undergoing a cornea transplant to restore her vision. IDENTITY AND CHANGE: The idea that a human changes through a period of time bring us to the question of "identity". We also face the question of responsibility in the changing scenario. The film measures Mumbai's changing scenario.

PERSONAL BELIEFS: The monk is faced with the dilemma of depending on the very people he is fighting against as a result of diagnosis, is forced to choose between dying and compromising beliefs.

MORALITY AND ETHICS: The film explores the intricacy of morality. The moral dilemma of all three protagonists ties the three different parts of the film.

MY CRITIC REVIEW: The Theseus paradox questions the ideas of authenticity, identity and death. There is a wealth of thought provoking incidents scattered in the film.
