ULTRA PROCESSED FOODS LINKED TO increased risk of cancer

Res<mark>earch from the Imperial Sch</mark>ool OF Public Health has produced one of the most comprehensive assessments to date of association between ultra processed foods and risk of developing cancers. Ultra processed foods are relatively cheap, convenient, heavily marketed, often as healthy options. But these foods are generally high in salt, sugar, fat and as well as artificial additives.

It is now documented that they are linked to a range of health problems including obesity, diabetes and cardiovascular disease.

The first UK study of its kind used the UK Bio bank records to collect information on diets of 200,000 middle aged adult participants. Researchers monitored participants' health over a 10 year period, monitoring the risk of developing 34 types of cancer. They also monitored the probability of people dying from cancer.

For every 10 percent increase in ultra processed foodstuffs in a persons diet, there was an increased risk of 2 percent cancer development overall, and 19 percent of ovarian cancer.

Each 10 percent increase in ultra processed food consumption was also associated with increased mortality for cancer overall by 6 percent, alongside 16 percent increase for breast cancer and 30 percent increase for ovarian cancer.

Dr Eszter Vamos, lead senior author of a study from Imperial College London School Of Public Health said, "This adds to growing evidence that ultra processed foods are likely to negatively impact our health including our risk for cancer . Given high level of consumption in UK adults and children, this has important implications for future health outcomes.

The World Health Organisation and United Nations Food and Agriculture Organisation has preciously recommended restricting ultra processed food as a part of healthy sustainable diet.

Their are ongoing efforts to reduce ultra processed food consumption around world, with countries such as Brazil, France and Canada updating their national dietary guidelines with recommendations to limit such food. Brazil has also banned marketing of ultra processed food in schools. There are currently no similar measures to tackle ultra processed food in India.

Lower income households are particularly vulnerable to cheap and unhealthy ultra processed foods. Minimally processed and freshly prepared meals should be substituted by packed goods to ensure everyone has access to healthy, nutritious and affordable options.

The study was funded by Cancer Research UK and World Cancer Research Fund.

Tara meets Don in Corsica. Don is a free-spirit, walking like there's no tomorrow. He talks to the mountains, drinks water directly from the river like an animal. Every word he speaks, seems to be coming from an imaginary realm of stories. They spend a week together promising to never meet again.

Ved and Don; Don and Ved. How could two entirely different personalities lie inside a single human? Which one is true? First half of the film leaves us with many such questions.

Tara's rejection takes a toll on Ved. All of the repressed emotions come to the surface, unwinding his entire personality. Tara reminded him of the person he used to be, before he took the role of a corportate robot.

Imtiaz Ali's film 'TAMASHA' is a story of a person frustrated with life. His daily routine might be a dream of many but for him, it was no less than a prison. The director's vision of a man chained by fate is depicted physically through various sweaters that Ved wore during the course of the film. Sweater in the scorching heat of Delhi is a metaphor for how trapped Ved felt in his mind. Ved removes his sweater in middle of chaos which disturbingly points out that he felt more freedom in that confused state than in his regular, mundane life.

The director's message was appropriately conveyed by a wonderful set of actors. Ranbir Kapoor as Ved is as convincing as anyone can get to depict a person so frustrated and teeming with repressed emotions. Deepika Padukone as Tara is a perfect companion to Ved in his journey to self-discovery.

Tamasha is a cry of every student's heart who could have taken the road less travelled rather than the standard path but settled for security than satisfaction. 'TAMASHA' has the potential to be a cult-classic considering its fan following. It encourages us to follow our passion and depicts what we become if we allow our dreams to dwindle. I would recommend everyone, especially the younger generation to watch this film.
